By introducing students to **diverse religious traditions**, the Religious Studies minor contributes to their professional success and their intellectual and civic development. The minor draws courses from **multiple academic disciplines** and pairs well with a wide range of majors in natural sciences, humanities, social sciences, business, and communication arts.

Minor Requirements

The Religious Studies minor consists of five courses, including:

- At least one comparative course or a course with a primary focus on non-Western religious traditions, such as:
 - Eastern Religious Traditions (REL 106)

 - Religion, the Body, and Sexuality (REL 274)
- At least one 300-level course, such as:
 - Religion and Social Justice (REL 307)
 - Ancient Greek Religions (REL 305)
 - Europe Transformed: Renaissance and Reformation (HIS 302)
 - Holocaust Literature (ENG 355)

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Why Minor in Religious Studies?

- Gain a better understanding and appreciation of other people's cultures and worldviews. (Good for being an effective co-worker and manager, awesome friend and neighbor, and a responsible citizen!)
- Develop skills essential to successful academic and professional careers: critical analysis, independent research skills, interdisciplinary thinking, and written and verbal communication skills.
- Ace graduate admission tests (GRE, LSAT, MCAT) and impress admissions committees with your unique academic background.
- Become employable in 30+ professional fields, including education, healthcare, government, counseling, social work, international business, chaplaincy, and law.

Benefits of a Religious Studies Minor

- Religious Studies graduates are among the top performers on the Law School Admissions Test (LSAT) and have a higher than average rate of acceptance into law schools (The University of Alabama).
- According to the AMC annual report on medical school acceptance rates for 2022, it was higher than average (51%) for students with a humanities background, which includes Religious Studies.
- According to the nation-wide data study on career outcomes for Religious Studies alumni, 82.5% were currently employed, 8.6% were not seeking employment, and 8.9% were not currently employed (Teagle Foundation/AAR Study, 2015).
